






A TREASURE TROVE OF FOLKLORE

SHIRE OF THE ALPS

If someone had asked J. R. R. Tolkien, the author of The Lord of the Rings, to compare the Central Valley to his Hobbits' enchanting homeland - the Shire, even he would probably have been surprised how much the two have in common. Yes, because the land we're talking about in this guide is mild and temperate, scattered with gentle slopes and verdant terraces.

It's a riot of grapes and gnarled vines where mighty chestnut trees alternate with clusters of forest fruits, where the scent of wild flowers mingles with the fragrance of freshly baked rye bread, chestnuts popping on hot embers, the strong smell of

figs, raisins and spiced meat. It's a land where the wine is so good that the first Aosta Valley wine to be awarded Denomination of Controlled Origin (DOC) classification was produced here.

However idyllic and peaceful it may seem, even this territory has its dark and bloodthirsty side. Between narrow ravines and sheer cliffs stand castles and fortresses steeped in ruthless charm, where fierce battles and daring feats took place, such as Napoleon's siege of the Fortress of Bard, and Caterina of Challant's tenacious resistance within the walls of Verrès castle.

Slightly sweet, slightly sour. At times this well-groomed valley becomes tousled and wild, especially where Mont Avic Natural Park's great pinewood expanses stand with their serene bodies of water, kaleidoscopic butterflies, and moonlit footpaths that teem with rustling and silent calls.

This is the ideal place for hikes and excursions, the ones pilgrims and wayfarers have been undertaking over the centuries along the Roman Road to Gaul and the Via Francigena – two meandering stone serpents that cut through medieval villages and cross bridges of secular beauty, branching off among gentle hills, leafy forests and

shrines enveloped in silence. Kissed by the sun and warm breeze, the Central Valley and the Mont Avic are a small treasure trove of splendour in which it is possible to rediscover the charm of rustic life and distant echoes of ancient legends carved in the rock.

Bonjour, V'm Valérie, your guide!

Hi there, stranger!

Yes, of course you're headed the right way: you're on the Roman Road that leads over the Alps to Gaul. How about stopping for a rest before going on your way?

I've got some rye bread and tasty slices of lard here. Go ahead, help yourself! While you're at it, take a sip of wine, too – I doubt you'll find any better along your travels.

By the way, my name's Valérie and I'm a vigneron, which means I'm a winegrower and I'll be happy to show you around the thriving wonders of this valley – the homeland of succulent grapes and bonny vines...



Wine producing is a traditional occupation in the Central Valley that goes far back in time, it is so deeply rooted that it has left its mark on local history. Some of the Aosta Valley's best wines come from here, where wine growing is glorified in all forms – from museums to village festivals.


















FORTRESS OF BARD

STANDING GUARD OVER THE VALLEY GATES

This impregnable fortress still echoes with the thunder of canons, the nervous cry of soldiers, the clanking of chains in prison nooks.

Owing to its strategic position at the valley entrance, this elegant yet merciless stronghold has played a leading role in incredible sieges and bloody battles, making life hard for illustrious figures such as Napoleon

Bonaparte and Camillo Benso di Cavour. Today it houses permanent museums and temporary exhibitions and has become one of the Aosta Valley's most important cultural centres.

ARNAD LARD

BETWEEN TEMPTING LAYERS OF DELICIOUSNESS

It smells of spice, mountain herbs, natural aromas. Hints of oak, larch and chestnut stand out in the exquisite delicacy of Lard d'Arnad, the only lard in all Europe granted Denomination of Protected Origin status.

The origins of this tasty cold cut go far back in time. Even today it is produced by scrupulously following traditional ageing methods inside wooden containers known as doïls. The lard is so tender it melts in the mouth and is best served on slices of rye bread dribbled with honey – especially when savoured at the festival held in its honour in Arnad at the end of August.

A TRIUMPH OF UNEXPLORED LIFE


This water painting coloured in iridescent hues that range from dark to light blue portrays enchanting

The surrounding absolute silence is broken only by the whistle of marmots, the call of soaring eagles and placid roar of streams and

waterfalls – welcome to Mont Avic Natural Park and its 5,747 hectares of impervious, untameable beauty.

ROMAN ARCH AND ROAD AT DONNAS

A ROAD NEVER LOST IN TIME

The Roman Road to Gaul is a historical route wending its way between Rome and the Rhone Valley. In Donnas you can admire some of the most amazing remains of this thoroughfare to be found in the entire Aosta Valley. These include a spectacular stone archway framing the horizon: a stunning engineering feat built using a technique that remained unrivalled for centuries.



To protect the village, the arch was once shut during night-time to create an impenetrable wall with the river and the mountain. Take a close look when you're there and you'll still see traces of wagon wheel ruts etched into the paved road!

ENTWINING OF PAST AND PRESENT

Once upon a time there were steamy cattle sheds where people and animals lived side by side to keep warm during long winter nights. Here, among soft straw and wobbly stools, time was marked by the soft rustling of snow and slow clacking of a loom. Waiting for spring to

come, whole families would busily weave fabric and make hemp garments in order to bring in some vital extra income.

This weaving tradition lives on today thanks to the cooperative "Lou Dzeut", a hemp weaving exhibition and ecomuseum set up inside an old cattle shed in Champorcher.

DAY ONE

Roman road and archway at Donnas

You cannot visit Donnas without having first strolled along its ancient tract of Roman road, or seen the spectacular Roman arch carved into the rock for over 220 metres - one of the Aosta Valley's most extraordinary feats of engineering.

2 Fortress of Bard and town

Devote an afternoon to visiting the Fortress of Bard: its exhibitions, displays and museums have made it one of northern Italy's chief cultural centres. Afterwards, saunter around the numerous historical dwellings in the enchanting village of Bard, one of the most beautiful in all Italy.

3 Caves Cooperatives de Donnas

In the heart of Aosta Valley's wine producing territory, don't miss a guided tour of the co-operative wine cellars in Donnas, where you can marvel at the store of over 150,000 bottles and taste top labels paired with cold cuts and cheeses.

CENTRAL VALLEY AND MONT AVIC IN A WEEKEND

DAY TWO

Mont Avic Park at Champorcher

Begin the day with an outing to the park's untouched countryside: take your pick from the countless trails radiating out into the protected area and that lead as far as neighbouring Gran Paradiso National Park, Mont Glacier and Mont Avic, or to the many surrounding lakes and huts.

2 Mont Avic Park Visitor Centre at Champorcher

Returning from your outing, stop off at Champorcher Visitor Centre: housed in a renovated old building, this interactive space helps you discover the park's specific characteristics by means of thematic itineraries enhanced with photographs, exhibits and scale models.

3 Lou Dzeut Co-operative and adjoining ecomuseum

Before ending your day, stop off at the hemp ecomuseum located in an old converted cowshed, where you can admire a wooden loom and original warper, and feel immersed in the rural past. Nearby you'll find find the co-operative that keeps the hand weaving tradition alive.



UNSPOILT SITES

THE LAND OF BUTTERFLIES

This peaceful land abounding in bewitching views and superb hikes has a mild, pleasant climate where orderly vines and dishevelled chestnut trees thrive among luxuriant meadows sprinkled with flowers. Don't miss the land lying between crags and steep gorges, and follow the gullies carved by gushing waters.

If you prefer places off the beaten track, then the rugged terrain of Mont Avic Natural Park will suit you perfectly with a riot of: a riot of glacial springs, meadows and peat bogs, where majestic forests and mighty lakes rule undisturbed...

High altitude blooming » Champorcher

TOUR OF THE RAVINES AT CHAMPORCHER, HÔNE AND PONTBOSET

Dizzying gorges, crystalline rocks and frothy waterfalls: if you're unafraid of great heights, then enjoy the walkway over Hône's three Goilles, the one at Pourtset in Champorcher and over Ratus ravine at Pontboset.

HOLAY POND NATURE RESERVE

Ever seen a spotted newt? Or a crested one? You can observe some very rare species of amphibians and plants at Holay Pond above Pont-Saint-Martin - the only place you'll find them in the Aosta Valley.



THE PEONIES OF LA BORNEY (ISSOGNE) AND COL FENÊTRE (PERLOZ)

This triumph of a thousand shades ranging from pink to crimson is a small miracle of nature - don't miss the amazing wild peonies that bloom at Col Fenêtre and in La Borney Alpine meadows.



BORNA DI LAOU ARBORETUM

The enchanting view from this suggestive arboretum (once a wolf's den) sweeps over gloomy mansions, sacred mountains and leisurely villages.

CHIGNAS AREA (OUTRE FER AND CAVOUR WALKS AT DONNAS)

Retrace Count Cavour's steps among the secular chestnut trees of Chignas woodlands, then explore the suggestive Outrefer circuit itineraries at Donnas.




PURE ENERGY

AN ENDLESS WALK

Perhaps it's thanks to its advantaged position as a point of transit that the Central Valley and the Mont Avic boast such a dense network of routes.

Not only can these be undertaken overland, along mountain trails and snowy tracks, but along water courses by dinghy or canoe, or airborne on climbing walls that reach far up into the sky. There are countless hiking routes, both horizontal and vertical, leading along ancestral roads pitted by the footsteps of explorers and by an neverending itinerary that you, too, can undertake today.

DESIRE FOR FLAVOUR

You can't claim to have truly been to the mountains if you haven't tried a local wine. So, plunge into an enthusiastic tasting of Arnad-Montjovet DOC, with its hints of leather and earth and aromas of spice and vanilla; otherwise treat yourself to a sip of delicious Donnas DOC, which recalls forest fruits and almonds.

If you're looking for something tasty to snack on while raising a toast then try Micóoula, traditional sweet bread with figs, chestnuts, raisins and walnuts, or sweet piata with apples, or its savoury version flavoured with garlic and cumin and served with a slice of Arnad lard.

HISTORY ROLLS ON

THE ANCIENT CHANT OF THE ROCK
