WHERE THE ROSE-TINTED GIANT LIVES ...

A handful of villages scattered like mountain flowers among lush meadows, icy glaciers and untamed forests. In the background rise summits peering down from dizzying heights, so close to the sky to be called stars.

In this land of ancient wisdom, gold mines and fragrant cheeses, some of the most remarkable sunsets you could possibly see in the Aosta Valley await you. And it's precisely here, between the burly shoulders of Monte Rosa that our journey commences. An extraordinary journey amid lakes sprinkled with water lilies and ancient castles now forgotten.



THE VALLEY OF MERCHANTS, ALMONST TOUCHING THE CLOUDS

If you'd been strolling through Ayas Valley some centuries ago, you'd have found it had a different name: Kramer Thal, namely "Valley of Merchants", because merchants from Valais transited this way in anticipation of striking a good deal. It didn't take long for the Walser people to settle here, bringing about a fusion of cultures that still today makes this land a fascinating crossroads of languages and traditions.

By the way, if you love travelling in time as well as by road, you'll find plenty of watchtowers and noble buildings in the Ayas Valley, some haunted by ghosts of the past. Like the castle of proud Caterina of Challant, a fearlessly courageous countess who took up arms in the desperate attempt to defend her beloved fiefdoms in a battle that turned into bloody sufferance.

If you prefer the charm of ancient ruins, then Graines castle is your best bet. Perched on a rocky promontory, it resembles a graceful eagle intent on observing passersby from its legend-rich nest.

Let's pretend for a moment that it could take flight over the Ayas Valley. What would it see? Undoubtedly an extraordinary sight: verdant woodlands, gushing streams, snow-clad peaks that pierce



the clouds as they emerge from Monte Rosa range.

But it's not necessary to climb up high to admire the splendours of this valley. There are easy excursions suited to everyone that lead to lakes, waterfalls, sunny mountain passes, or pleasant exploratory walks into the secrets of nature reserves and their croaky residents.

At least once you'll be compelled to lose yourself among the willowy reeds of Lake Villa or go hunting for gold in the bowels of the mountain, among the gloomy tunnels of Brusson mines or follow the course of Ru Courtod, whose cheerful

gurgling recounts the history of one the Aosta Valley's most impressive irrigation systems.

Your eyes filled with wonder, it is time to fill your stomach. You'll be spoilt for choice by the vast array of both Valdostan and Walser specialities: cured meats, polenta, cheeses, in addition to tempting sweets and excellent wines.

Bondjor, V'm Christophe, your guide!

I'm also a master sabotier. What? You've never heard of sabots?

They're a type of footwear people are fond of where I come from that keep your feet snug and dry.

By the way, I bet a piece of lard that you need a guide. Who could be better than an Ayassin to lead you to the most picturesque and hidden corners of this valley?

What luck you bumped into me – an artisan with shoulders as solid as wood but whose heart is as gentle as a snow finch.

I know the Ayas Valley better than the palm of my hand; so follow me, one step at a time... and don't forget to put on your sabots!



Sabots are a type of footwear traditionally worn in the Ayas Valley. These clogs are made by hollowing out a single piece of wood and was done during the wintertime when outdoor farm work came to a standstill. Today, only a handful of Ayas master sabotier continue this precious tradition.

DOWNHILL SKIING

SLIDING WHITE AT THE LIMITS OF THE SKY

Explore three different valleys that straddle two regions – this is what you'll do when you put on skis and plunge down the panoramic slopes of Monterosa Ski as the ski area connects the Ayas Valley to neighbouring Valley of Gressoney, then continues over into Piedmont. It consists of a maze of sun-kissed slopes that encircle a bulk of celestial ice - Monte Rosa - like a silver ribbon.

If you prefer peace and quiet to thrills and adventure, there are smaller resorts such as Antagnod, Brusson and Col de Joux with wide, meandering runs lined by trees and affording vistas borrowed from a fairy tale book.





CHAMOUSIRA MINE

WHEN HARD ROCK HAS A HEART OF GOLD



They wouldn't be real mountains if they didn't hide gloomy tunnels and buried treasure within their depths. Close your eyes and try to picture rattling wagons, the rhythmic chipping of miners' axes, the weak flickering of a flame ready to die out and plunge the world into darkness.

It was in the abyss of Brusson mine that in 1899, far from the comforting caress of light, a handful of brave men decided to face underground dangers to bring to the surface precious gold trapped in those winding tunnels of intriguing memories.







RU COURTOD

THE GENTLE MURMURING OF THE GLACIER

Get ready to be left breathless, not from tiredness but because you're about to admire a truly incredible work of engineering. The construction of ru Courtod began in 1393, the longest irrigation channel in the region that served to collect glacial water and convey it down the valley.



These days, if you decide to follow the footpath alongside it, you'll find yourself meandering through time, lulled by the silvery murmur of the stream, amongst woodlands and bright green meadows, creaky bridges and damp stone cottages that guard a history of dignified grace.



WALSER VILLAGES

AMONG OLD GRANARIES AND STADDLE STONES

Often, while walking in the mountains you're bound to lose track of time, especially when encountering fragments of history that make you doubt whether you're still living in the present.

Crest, Cuneaz, Frantze, Résy, Fiery,
Soussun and Mascognaz: take
note of these village names because
the past has cast its long mantle
over houses, watermills, bread ovens and
chapels, preserving their bygone splendour. These magnificent
constructions were built by the Walsers, people of Germanic
origin who settled at the foot of Monte Rosa in medieval times,
and who left a strong imprint on the landscape, especially in the
form of rascards - traditional farmers' dwellings of that time.







LAKE VILLA NATURE RESERVE

A TEAR SHED BY NATURE

Along the calm shores of this charming lake, soft reeds bow in the mountain breeze, lulled by a warbling

amphibian orchestra. All around, among pine and chestnut trees,

larch and birch trees, foxes and squirrels move soft-footed, while owls, woodpeckers and buzzards hover above the trees in a fluttering of feathers.

When you sit relaxing on the sunny meadow and listen to the lapping of waves, don't forget to observe the white water lilies floating on the surface beyond the

jetty because the only place you'll find them in the Aosta Valley is at Villa nature reserve.

Piani di Verra and Blue Lake


Let yourself fall under the spell of some of the Ayas Valley's most suggestive spots: depart from Saint-Jacques des Allemands – a land abounding in old Walser settlements, and reach Piani di Verra, which afford an unmatched vista over Great Verra Glacier.

Not far from here you'll find Blue Lake, a marvellous water pearl nestled amongst Monte Rosa's jagged walls. On the return journey towards Champoluc, stop to admire the fairytale sculptures in Villy Wood. 2 Village of Antagnod

A stop in the village is recommended: don't miss the Museum of Sacred Art, Church of San Martino, charming Maison Fournier and IVAT boutique selling traditional handicraft.

Fromagerie Haut Val d'Ayas

If you want an all-round experience of the world of excellent cheese, then stop at Brusson dairy, which offers tastings of their range of exquisite cheeses on sale.

After tasting unmistakable Fromadzo DOP at the dairy, it will be time to devote some time to Brusson's cultural beauty: stroll among quaint alleyways and enchanting dwellings, such as Casa Yonzo and La Maison du Compte, take a look at the majestic organ in the Church of San Maurizio and have fun immortalising the most characteristic nooks of this village seeped in history with a camera or simply with your mind's eye.

Challand-Saint-Victor

Having finished a delicious lunch of local products, it'll be time for an easy walk to Lake Villa at Challand-Saint-Victor: a nature reserve that restores body and soul, and where curious animals, not to mention some very rare plants, create a show of romantic beauty.

While you're here, pay a visit to the noble ruins of Villa Castle and see spirited Challand Art – an open air museum set up... in the woods!



UNSPOILT SITES

RARE ENCOUNTERS AND EXCEPTIONAL BEAUTY

In the Ayas Valley, nature likes to break records. Out of its scented hat it pulls species that are impossible to find in the rest of the region, such as white water lilies, water knotweed and elusive orchids. It's a surprising valley that hosts the most extensive cathedral of mountains in the Alps, in addition to a nature reserve that proudly bears the title "Italian Marvel".


Here, amidst meadows and gentle slopes, glacial waters flow down to weave a web of streams. The ones that stand out most are the ru - manmade irrigation channels whose gurgling will accompany you on your awe-inspiring hikes.



MONTE ROSA MOUNTAIN RANGE

A giant that stands over 4,000 metres in height and who torments the clouds with his long, slender fingers. In actual fact, its name – rouja - means "ice".

On the subject of sport, did you know that in the Ayas Valley there's the largest natural ice rink in the Aosta Valley? With 18 km of trails in Ayas and 50 km in Brusson, there's no lack of skiing choice. Trails wind among the houses like snowy snakes of whipped cream.



DESIRE FOR FLAVOUR

The aroma recalls fresh milk and mountain herbs; the flavour summer pastures, cows with a kindly and curious demeanour, fragrant hay and small Alpine farmsteads set like gemstones among plateaus and ridges. Slightly sweet, slightly tangy, slightly salty, this cheese has origins that go far back in time and was a source of phosphorus and vitamins; it is a vital ingredient of countless delicious recipes.

A holiday in the Ayas Valley certainly wouldn't be the same without tasting a slice of Fromadzo DOP, perhaps at the end of summer, on the occasion of "Monterosa Gourmand" Festival, or at the Fromagerie Haut Val d'Ayas, in Brusson.





HISTORY ROLLS ON

ABOUT TORMENTED SOULS AND PRODIGIOUS SPRINGS

The Ayas Valley is a land of unmerciful legends and ancient truths; it's the home of wealthy families who have left a mark on the history of the Aosta Valley. Its mountains have hosted popes and countesses, poets and fighters, and each one has left their anchor in time precisely in this valley.

So, don't be surprised if you can still dip your fingers into the miraculous waters of Notre-Dame du Bon Secours Shrine in Barmasc, hear the wails of Caterina of Challant's ghost at Maison du Compte or admire valuable works, such as the rare Madonna dello Scrigno in Antagnod church museum.



ANTAGNOD

Seen from above, the small houses of Antagnod resemble a flock of sheep driven by a willowy shepherd – the bell tower. Boasting a gem of a church, it is considered one of the most beautiful villages in Italy.



GRAINES CASTLE VIA CRUCIS AT COL PORTOLA

A stone eagle perched upon a rocky spur. Its claws guard buried treasures and tales of damsels with alabaster skin.

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An excursion that rises to 2,414 metres along a summerscented footpath, where evocative bas-reliefs overlook pastel-shaded flowers.



RUVÈRE WATERMILL

CHALLAND-SAINT-ANSELME

You can still inhale the aroma of grain, walnut oil and old millstones grinding away in this old mill - a custodian of bygone agricultural tools.

SHRINE OF SANT'ANNA

CHALLAND-SAINT-ANSELME

A suggestive church affording an exceptionally panoramic vista. Every year a traditional "incanto", (auction) is held here to raise funds for the shrine's upkeep.



CHALLAND-SAINT-VICTOR



Let's take a look at Verval and Challand-Saint-Victor bridges, it's easy to see them as the curved backs of two gigantic stone donkeys.

BONOT TOWER

Crackling flames that set alight the night. Once, fires were lit at the top of this signal tower to communicate with neighbouring castles.

CHALLAND-SAINT-VICTOR

LA MAISON DU COMPTE AND YONZO HOUSE

If you decide to visit the centre of Brusson, don't forget to see Yonzo house, a farmhouse with unusual architectural features, but also Maison du Compte, which is a genuine piece of history.

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CHURCHES, CHAPELS AND SHRINES

Whether they be large and grandiose or small and modest, shrines, churches and chapels are strung out throughout the Ayas Valley in a suggestive, sacred procession.

VILLA CASTLE

CHALLAND-SAINT-VICTOR

Don't be deceived by appearances: these ancient ruins are what remains of the Aosta Valley's oldest castle and glorious past of the Challant family.



VILLA DAIRY

CHALLAND-SAINT-VICTOR

Here, amongst buckets, cauldrons and water tanks, dairymen processed their milk into cheese in the 1950s.

IT'S ALL A QUESTION OF BALANCE

Do you know about elves who live up trees and use rope bridges, creaky walkways and tangled lianas to get from one tree to another?

Well, if you've ever wondered how they do it then have a go yourself at Champoluc adventure park. There are over 30 airborne walking activities – rope ladders, wobbly platforms and zip lines that hang in the void. The fun will continue also in winter, in Antagnod, where you'll find the baby snowpark, with plays and descents on the snow. One piece of advice: if you want a rest after all this adventure then enjoy a relaxing afternoon at the playgrounds in Ayas or Brusson.







BATAILLES DES REINES
